IN THE COMMISSIONERS COURT OF MONTAGUE COUNTY, TEXAS

ORDER EXEMPTING EMS SERVICE FROM COMPETITIVE BIDDING PROCEDURES

÷

BE IT REMEMBERED, that on the 10th day of April, 2017, the Commissioners Court of Montague County, Texas, after due notice, took up for consideration and possible action the exercise of discretion authorized by §262.024 of the Texas Local Government Code, subsection (a) (2), to exempt from competitive bidding procedures EMS service in a specified portion of the county.

IT IS the finding of the Commissioners Court that the public interest will be served by County agreement of service to be used for the better and more efficient delivery of governmental services or public benefits. It is the further finding that competitive bidding procedures are not likely to produce the best value nor are such procedures appropriate for the specific needs of the County in regard to the specific item or service so acquired.

IT IS THEREFORE ORDERED that the County Commissioners Court has determined to grant the statutory exemption for EMS service in a specified portion of the county as provided by §262.024 of the Texas Local Government Code.

§ 262.024. Discretionary Exemptions

Effective: September 1, 2007

Currentness

- (a) A contract for the purchase of any of the following items is exempt from the requirement established by Section 262.023 if the commissioners court by order grants the exemption:
 - (1) an item that must be purchased in a case of public calamity if it is necessary to make the purchase promptly to relieve the necessity of the citizens or to preserve the property of the county;
- (2) an item necessary to preserve or protect the public health or safety of the residents of the county;
 - (3) an item necessary because of unforeseen damage to public property:
 - (4) a personal or professional service;
 - (5) any individual work performed and paid for by the day, as the work progresses, provided that no individual is compensated under this subsection for more than 20 working days in any three month period;
 - (6) any land or right-of-way;
 - (7) an item that can be obtained from only one source, including:
 - (A) items for which competition is precluded because of the existence of patents, copyrights, secret processes, or monopolies;

(B) films, manuscripts, or books;
(C) electric power, gas, water, and other utility services; and
(D) captive replacement parts or components for equipment;
(8) an item of food;
(9) personal property sold:
(A) at an auction by a state licensed auctioneer;
(B) at a going out of business sale held in compliance with Subchapter F, Chapter 17, Business & Commerce Code; or
(C) by a political subdivision of this state, a state agency of this state, or an entity of the federal government;
(10) any work performed under a contract for community and economic development made by a county under Section 381.004; or
(11) vehicle and equipment repairs.
(b) The renewal or extension of a lease or of an equipment maintenance agreement is exempt from the requiremen established by Section 262.023 if the commissioners court by order grants the exemption and if:
(1) the lease or agreement has gone through the competitive bidding procedure within the preceding year;
(2) the renewal or extension does not exceed one year; and
(3) the renewal or extension is the first renewal or extension of the lease or agreement.

- (c) If an item exempted under Subsection (a)(7) is purchased, the commissioners court, after accepting a signed statement from the county official who makes purchases for the county as to the existence of only one source, must enter in its minutes a statement to that effect.
- (d) The exemption granted under Subsection (a)(8) of this section shall apply only to the sealed competitive bidding requirements on food purchases. Counties shall solicit at least three bids for purchases of food items by telephone or written quotation at intervals specified by the commissioners court. Counties shall award food purchase contracts to the responsible bidder who submits the lowest and best bid or shall reject all bids and repeat the bidding process, as provided by this subsection. The purchasing officer taking telephone or written bids under this subsection shall maintain, on a form approved by the commissioners court, a record of all bids solicited and the vendors contacted. This record shall be kept in the purchasing office for a period of at least one year or until audited by the county auditor.

Re: Bowie Emergency Ambulance Service

Dear Judge Lewis:

I wanted to inform you of action taken by the Bowie City Council at last evening's special council meeting. After discussion with our electrical consultants and their recommendation to raise electrical rates it was the council's decision to maintain the current electrical rates.

Instead the council approved a number of cost reducing actions. One of the actions was the resolution to notify Montague County Commissioners Court of the city's intention to discontinue ambulance services outside the city limits of Bowie, Texas, effective October 1, 2017. As I discussed with the commissioners last year the city is experiencing a significant net revenue loss in our ambulance operation, and this is one of the steps in an effort to improve that situation.

Respectfully, I would like to ask the court to consider a request for pricing regarding ambulance services in the southern part of Montague County, excluding the City of Bowie. Please know we will work with you to provide any historical data you might need to assist with your RFP request, including data inside the city limits as well. Mr. Tow and I will make ourselves available to discuss any RFP options you would like to discuss.

Although September 30, 2017 will be our last day to provide service outside the city, we will be available to provide mutual aid as necessary to the provider the court chose. I want to make this transition as seamless as possible. If it should be beneficial to the county to provide ambulance service at an earlier date we would be willing to work toward accomplishing that goal.

Please contact me whenever I or the city staff may assist you.

Councilor Davis moved, with a second from Councilor Gunter, to direct staff to review City Police Department operations and recommend cost savings in 45 days. Motion carried five with councilors Bell, Boyd, Davis, Graham, and Gunter voting Aye.

Councilor Gunter moved, with a second from Councilor Graham, to direct staff to review the Summer Recreation Program to cut cost or increase revenues to save money. Motion carried five with councilors Bell, Boyd, Davis, Graham, and Gunter voting Aye.

Councilor Davis moved, with a second from Councilor Gunter, to direct staff to review the sewer operations in effort to reduce or eliminate the net revenue loss. Motion carried five with councilors Bell, Boyd, Davis, Graham, and Gunter voting Aye.

Councilor Davis moved, with a second from Councilor Bell, to direct staff to review the employee insurance program and determine which options are available to reduce cost. Motion carried five with councilors Bell, Boyd, Davis, Graham, and Gunter voting Aye.

Councilor Bell moved, with a second from Councilor Davis, to have a hiring freeze unless an employee replacement is authorized by council. Motion carried five with councilors Bell, Boyd, Davis, Graham, and Gunter voting Aye.

Discussion and action for Customer Education Campaign. Develop customer education campaign that provides for better understanding of the value proposition for customers of the City of Bowie in having an electric system and how it provides for value for the local community.

Councilor Graham moved, with a second from Councilor Gunter, to direct Schneider Engineering to draft a

proposal for the Customer Education Campaign for council to review. Motion carried five with councilors Bell, Boyd, Davis, Graham, and Gunter voting Aye.

With no further business to discuss, Mayor Slack adjourned the meeting at 8:08 p.m.
